WIDC recognizes the term Woman/Women is in an evolution of language and note that our intention in our use is to be fully inclusive of underrepresented persons who may or may not identify as women and share the goals and values of WIDC to promote these marginalized voices and stories. Further, we gratefully acknowledge that the WIDC program originates from the traditional and unceded lands of the Coast Salish people, including the xmkym (Musqueam), Swxwu7mesh (Squamish), and slilwta (Tseil-wau-tuth) Nations. We also acknowledge the Indigenous Nations on whose traditional lands our guests, participants, and colleagues live, work and create. We commit to working together in the spirit of collaboration and respect for the generations that came before, those living now, and the generations to come.

PROGRAMS

During 2022-2023 WIDC programs continued to be delivered via Zoom. Workshop days were shorter and the number of days per module lengthened to accommodate Zoom fatigue. Application fees and tuition continued to be waived, a value of approximately \$20k.

Thirty-four Canadian women and non-binary director participants, fifteen ACTRA actors and twenty-seven Instructors and Industry guests directly participated in WIDC programs this fiscal. **WIDC alumnae directors' names are bolded.**

Equity, Diversity & Inclusion (EDI) Work:

This module specially designed for WIDC by alumna **Dr. Rita Shelton Deverell C.M.** and fellow scholar and filmmaker, Dr. Dorothy Cucw-la7 Christian, offers articles written by the instructors, engages in anti-racism exercises, and discussions, investigates micro-aggressions and the importance of self-location and land acknowledgments. Participants are guided in developing their own personalized EDI Pledge. The EDI Pledge and theme of EDI is woven throughout all WIDC. programs and activities.

WIDC Career Advancement Module (CAM):



Fall 2022 Edition: was presented in October 2022, in collaboration with St John's International Women's Film Festival, and the Reelworld Film Festival. Mandated to include a minimum 50% of director participants in this cohort would be from under-represented racialized communities the eight director participants included: Alexandra Martinez Crowther, Asis Sethi, Cailleah Scott Grimes, Catharine Parke, Elizabeth Fraser, Giselle Miller, Holly Brace-Lavoie, Shelly Hong, selected by a peer jury. Directors prepped for upcoming deadlines with support from WIDC one to one follow up coaching sessions. The cohort has also set up an online check-in group to help keep each other on track. The Spring cohort will meet with the same industry guests, along with mentor directors, **Gail Maurice** and **Dr. Jules Koostachin**.

Spring 2023 Edition: Began March 3, and will continue with once per week sessions through to July 3, 2023. WIDC Story & Leadership Program:



PART 1: was delivered November 2022, to eight director participants (Liz Whitmere, Luvia Petersen, Naomi Mark, Nika Belianina, Osas Eweka Smith, Sam Coyle, Sarah Strange, Supinder Wraich) who developed their leadership and their fiction feature films and series projects. Dr. Carol Whiteman facilitated, with lead instructors Dr. Carolyn Mamchur, Karen Walton, Lori Triolo, Veena Sood, and mentor director, Mina Shum. Panel discussions and one-to-one sessions about the Director/DOP

relationship, preparing pitch n ACTRA and blacking were held with IATSE DOP's Kim Derko, CSC and Gayle Ye. This year's gen... and blacking were held with IATSE DOP's Kim Derko, CSC and ion members included Christina Scioli, Dmyitry Chepovetsky, Jo Bates, Kalyn Miles, Kaylah Zander, Knox Hamilton, Kyle Bailey, Lexi Doig, Lissa Neptuno, Lovina Yavari, Marsha Regis, Megan Leitch, Miles Foley, Nathan Witte, Stephen Adekolu. They workshopped the directors' scripts (1 series and 7 feature films) through audition simulation exercises, table reads, rehearsals, and a modified blocking for camera exercise via Zoom.

<u>PART 2:</u> (WIDC Whistler Film Festival Industry Immersion) was delivered over 17 days, offering the director participants festival passes to attend the summit, screenings and the festival signature Women In Focus series. The directors met in roundtables with industry experts: Kim Hsu Guise (Telefilm Canada), Gosia Kamela (CBC Films), Mitch Geddes (Bell Media), Mark Shapland / Carly McGowan (IPF), and Digital Media Marketing Mentor, Annelise Larson (Veria.ca). In addition, through the Whistler Film Festival, directors attended over 80 one-to-one meetings with industry guests.

<u>PART 3:</u> (one-to-one story consultation), meetings with Mentor Story Editor, Karen Walton ran January – February 2023.

<u>PART 4:</u> (career coaching), continues to be delivered through June 2023, and includes 3 hours each career coaching with Dr. Carol Whiteman, plus additional roundtables with a Mentor Director and Guest Producer, TBA.

OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

WIDC Launch & Awards Events:

<u>June 3, 2022</u>, WIDC launched its 26th annual slate of activities and presented two WIDC awards at a Zoom event with over 30 guests in attendance. The Inaugural WIDC Advantage Award was presented to alumna, **Luvia Petersen** and the 2022 BANFF Fellowship Award was presented to **Carolyn Saunders** (see more later in this report).

November 27, 2022, WIDC hosted a Fall Awards Zoom Event attended by approximately 30 where recent program cohorts were introduced, the Spring slate of programs was launched. The 2022 Feature Film Award was presented to **Susanne Serres** (*Celestine*) and CBC Films WIDC Talent Development Awards were presented to **Lindsay McIntyre** (2021) and **Nauzanin K. Knight** (2022). See other areas in the report for details.

Collaboration with Weengushk Film Institute (WIFI):

WIDC offered one hour of 1+1 coaching for each of the five participants WFI's Women In Film Intensive for Indigenous and Black Women and Non-Binary Filmmakers. Two of the five participants have accessed their coaching session. A third participant requested additional time to prepare for their session.

WIDC has pledged to award up to two spots for these directors to attend an upcoming WIDC CAM session. The award will be adjudicated in collaboration with WFI Executive Director and Founder, Dr. Shirley Cheechoo.

WIDC Safer Creative Spaces: Building a Mental Health Tool-kit Project:

Inspired by work with WIDC's Talent to Watch projects and with funding support from the Canada Council for the Arts this one-year special project aims to create a tool-kit, workshop and protocols for ultra-low budget productions in Canada. In January 2023, a leadership team comprised of four leaders, one from each of WIDC, Family Services of Greater Victoria, Songhees Nation Family Counselling and a woman-led independent production company has begun gathering research and conducting consultations with mental health professionals, adult educators, artists, and members from under-represented communities. The project will culminate at the end of 2023 with a full report.

Other Collaborations:

Through community collaborations, WIDC alumnae have received discounts to attend TIFF, VIFF, SJIWFF, FeFF, VIWFF, WFF and BANFF while WIDC offers promotional consideration, volunteer moderators and guest speakers.

AWARDS

WIDC Feature Film Award:



2022 award recipient, **Susanne Serres** for her debut feature, *Celestine*. The story is inspired by Susanne's own lived experiences as a Black queer woman living in Montreal. The award is valued at up to \$250,000 in kind services and rentals and was adjudicated by an alumnae peer jury and award sponsors. The film went to camera March 2 to 19, 2023 and will complete a second block of shooting in August 2023 when production will focus on the graphic novel elements of the film, supported by MELS virtual studio.

WIDC Advantage Award:



A WIDC peer jury selected **Luvia Petersen** and her debut feature, the psychological thriller *Human Nature*, as the inaugural recipient of the Advantage Award. The award offers WIDC's nomination for Telefilm Talent to Watch funding, a one-year mentorship along with a spot at the 2022-23 Story & Leadership program.

<u>Carolyn Saunders</u> received the 2022 WIDC Banff Fellowship which included a full pass to the online festival, along with a 2-month mentorship to help Carolyn prepare for her meetings at BANFF and strategize follow up. Carolyn attended the festival in person to pitch her feature film and television series projects.

CBC Films WIDC Talent Development Award:



2021 winner, Lindsay McIntyre (*The Words We Can't Speak*, also the 2021 winner of the WIDC Feature Film Award) used part of her \$10,000 cash award to attend the Whistler Film Festival Screenwriters Lab to further develop her script. The remainder of the cash award has been allocated to mentorship, research trips to the North. Lindsay is in postproduction on a short concept film funded by the ISO, set to complete in spring 2023.

2022 winner, Nauzanin Knight (When I was George) was announced and celebrated at the WIDC Awards Zoom reception, November 27, 2023. Will receive a spot at Story & Leadership and a cash award of \$3,000.





MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The CWWA Board is comprised of President & CEO, Dr. Carol Whiteman, alumnae representatives, **Siobhan Devine**, **Juanita Peters**, **Rama Rau**, and ACTRA representative / Board Executive Officer, **Heather Allin**.



With the addition of this year's cohorts, there are now **334 WIDC director alumnae** residing across Canada and internationally. A growing percentage (27%) are DGC members while approximately 27% are ACTRA members crossing over to directing. Over 30% self-identify as being from equity-deserving communities: Black, Indigenous, Persons of Colour. WIDC has not officially collected data on participation rates of individuals who identify as LGTBQ2SIA+ or as Persons with Disabilities. The Board continues to seek the counsel of community experts for guidance on respectful self-identification policy to help better implement, track and report on equity, diversity, and inclusion.

More WIDC alumnae became members of the DGC this year. While we have not collected comprehensive data on alumnae directors hired to direct episodic, or as directing producers and showrunners, we do know they are directing on series in record numbers across Canada, in the US and internationally.

On behalf of the Creative Women Workshops Association Board of Directors who oversee the WIDC program, we are extremely grateful to our sponsors and

community collaborators who have stuck with us during the continuing challenging times caused by COVID-19. We know the successes of WIDC alumnae are due in no small part to the consistent and ongoing confidence shown through these important relationships. It has been inspiring to work with the media sector and alumnae across Canada this past year.
