Launched in 1996/97, Women In the Director's Chair (WIDC) offers Canadian women media creators a seriously road-tested <u>safe and inclusive space</u> for professional advancement, authentic voice, and the development of narrative media content.

The term woman/women is in an evolution of language and we note that our intention in our use is to be fully inclusive of underrepresented persons who may identify as she/her and or they/them and share the goals and values of WIDC to promote these marginalized voices and stories.

WIDC gratefully acknowledges that the WIDC program originates from the traditional and unceded lands of the Coast Salish people, including the xmkym (Musqueam), Swxwu7mesh (Squamish), and slilwta (Tseil-wau-tuth) Nations. ALL WIDC programs now begin with a 2-hour **Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Work** session presented by



- NEW Working In Episodic Roundtables augmented with the support of the Directors Guild of Canada (52 directors have attended WIE sessions so far this fiscal)







- To develop the *external confidence* of potential collaborators and industry in mid-career women writer/directors and directors by *building trusted allies* who will champion the advancement of their careers and project(s).
- To create a space where *creative risk-taking* and *innovation* can lead to discoveries of *under-represented voices* and the *creation of media content* for Canadian and international audiences.
- To *collaborate* with like-minded individuals, institutions, and organizations to maximize our collective effect.



### WIDC BANFF FELLOWSHIP AWARD

Joy Haskell is a BC-based Indigenous story-teller who was also selected as a recipient of the BANFF DOV program. She subsequently was selected for the CFC / Netflix Feature Film Accelerator and the Academy Program for Indigenous Women Directors. She received CMF development funding for her series, *Hey Cousin*. Through WIDC she connected with fellow alumna Rebeka Herron who is now a producer for Joy's feature film *Cookies or Crack*.
